Verbal Behavior

At the core of Skinner's functional analysis of verbal behavior is the distinction among the mand, tact, and intraverbal. These three types of verbal behavior are traditionally all classified as "expressive language." Skinner suggests that this classification masks important distinctions among functionally independent types of language.

Moreover, an integrated definition of verbal behavior is offered in Upon Further Reflection (Skinner, 1987): "Verbal behavior is behavior that is reinforced through the mediation of other people, but only when the other people are behaving in ways that have been shaped and maintained by an evolved verbal environment, or language" (p. 90).
